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From the Chairman

This is the first Annual Report of The Johnston Collection. We have no statutory obligation to produce one. However, the Trustees considered that with the amount of activity we undertake, it would be useful to record a summary of each year so that we, and our successors, can look back at issues and trends. The Director will report on the full scope of activities during the year.



For the Trustees, it has been a year in which we have taken an exhaustive look at the future direction of the organisation. This has not been easy and we have yet to make the difficult decisions that are required to ensure The Johnston Collection has a sustainable future. However, we now have all the information to help us make those decisions. Our efforts in this regard have focussed on three areas outlined below.

First, we explored how we could take better advantage of our properties to improve facilities for visitors and staff. In this regard we continued looking at options for redevelopment. As part of this process we developed a long term master-plan for the Trust's properties and we sought approval for this from the City of Melbourne. Regrettably, this was opposed by several neighbours and we had to resort to having the matter heard at VCAT. VCAT not only approved our planning permit, but made suggestions (such as a dedicated bus parking bay) that would considerably improve our circumstances.

After examining how to begin implementation of this master-plan, we determined the first stage would need to be an upgrade of *Fairhall* and modest changes to the Administration wing and 150 Hotham Street. This will provide better conditions for staff and volunteers, and improve our exhibitions and other public programmes. We rationalised our property portfolio by selling 146 Hotham Street, as we had acquired 148 the previous year and it is a much more useful property for us.

Secondly, we explored options for dealing with our annual deficit in order to make us financially sustainable. It is generally considered that the Trust is very well off financially. This is not the case. The Trust makes a considerable loss each year and has done so for many years. Before the GFC, this was offset by many years of successful investment strategy which disguised the trading loss from the museum operations. The Trustees have been looking at options to eliminate the deficit and provide long term certainty to The Johnston Collection. These discussions are well advanced, but no firm decisions have been made to date. They have included consideration of investment strategies, fundraising, pricing structures, property portfolio, scale and scope of our operations, competitors, and the cultural significance of our assets. These are a complex set of parameters and



it has been necessary to explore each so that we can make informed and rational decisions.

Thirdly, we articulated a vision for the future. This vision:

accepted that many changes have been made to Fairhall since it was bequeathed. We have recognised this as a virtue as it encourages greater freedom to explore the possibilities for how the property is used and shown; aligned itself with the public's interest in all matters relating to taste, style and design including fashion, decorative arts, interiors, architecture, graphics, gardens etc.

Next year promises to be one where major decisions are made to align these three issues and ensure, not just a sustainable financial future for The Johnston Collection, but also one that makes a very positive contribution to the cultural life of Victoria.

We have been very grateful for the support we receive. This year, in particular, we were pleased to receive a donation of \$50,000 from one of our Ambassadors, Mr Roger Brookes, \$5,000 from Margaret Cash, and also a bequest of \$46,000

from the estate of the late Mrs Alwynne Beryl Jona OAM. Such gifts are always gratefully received and are a welcome acknowledgement that the work we do is enjoyed and respected.

Everyone associated with The Johnston Collection has worked extremely hard during the year and I thank everyone most sincerely. These include my fellow Trustees, Graeme Blackman OAM, Tom Hazell AO and Peter Walsh. We were joined at every meeting by our Honorary Treasurer, Joe Groher, who I particularly acknowledge for the huge amount of work he has undertaken to help us plan for the future. I also thank all the Volunteers, Guides, Ambassadors and Friends without whom we would not be able to achieve what we do. I pay a special tribute to Robert Thomson. who stood down as President of The Friends during the year after making a very significant contribution to The Friends over many years. And lastly, I thank all the staff, under the direction of Louis Le Vaillant, who juggle the million things we do with a brilliant mix of professionalism, fun and hard work.

From the Director

This inaugural Annual Report offers a rewarding opportunity for us to share with you an extensive account of what we have all achieved at The Johnston Collection over the last year. We hope that by creating an Annual Report it will recall, recollect and record these achievements and act as a reminder of our contribution to the cultural sector and to those who have not only participated in our programmes but also those who actively follow what we do.



Our public programmes continue to engage and challenge what house-museums can do. Fairhall delivered its three distinct tours: 'The House of Ideas' series, the Christmas Tour and the 'Mr Johnston' series. Romance Was Born's founders, Anna Plunkett and Luke Sales', well considered curation in 'The House of Ideas' series, extended our interpretation possibilities to younger audiences. Rejoice! returned selected creations from the last five years of our Christmas tours. The 'Mr Johnston' series saw Melbourne-based Barb Brownlow and Alexandra Brownlow of Brownlow Interior Design 'rearrange' Fairhall. Within this mix,

we continued to add to our series of innovative 'menu' *Fairhall* tours, including *Unlocking the Collection*, which focussed on specific aspects of the Collection.

Our two Gallery exhibitions, Commanding Splendour: The Duke of Wellington & the Empire Style and Women Making History: Writers, Thinkers, Makers, Icons 1700 – 1900, extended the stories we tell based on the Collection.

The regular weekly lecture programme and educational activities organised for lifelong learning, including the Annual Study Day, have again proved popular. The diverse lecture programme welcomed back familiar lecturers, as well as introducing new speakers. Our aim is always to be engaging and popular, without being overly didactic, by selecting topics and themes which relate to a wide sphere of interests. This was further developed with handling workshops enhancing the learning experience at a practical level.

Visitor numbers have continued to be strong for house-museum tours and lectures, and are evidence of the success with which the Collection has been able to develop and deliver its programmes.

Press coverage and media interest in the Collection continues to be generated to very high levels. Of note was excellent coverage relating to Romance Was Born, especially in new social media platforms. External partnerships and collaborative programmes with The Melbourne Food and Wine Festival, the Open House Melbourne scheme and L'Oreal Melbourne Fashion Festival, amongst others, extended awareness of us to other likeminded communities. As a result, the Collection was increasingly recognised and valued through

successfully raising its profile regionally, nationally and now internationally.

The Collection has also been ably sustained by our support groups: The Ambassadors, The Friends and Volunteers. The Ambassadors continue to provide collection advice and assistance to the Trustees and Director in advancing the Museum. The Friends of The Johnston Collection, through their social activities and events, have contributed over \$12,500 to support our programmes. We sincerely thank Robert Thomson for his generous contribution as President of the Committee of The Friends of The Johnston Collection. Sue Logie-Smith has now adeptly taken over the role.

We also salute our Volunteer Guides and Volunteers for their dedication and wonderful contribution in sharing our stories throughout the year. The recruitment and new intake of volunteer guides commenced in July 2012, and as they continue their training, we welcome them to our existing team of dedicated Volunteers.

The last five years, from 2009 to 2013, has been a period which has involved many rigorous discussions about the Collection's essential purpose, strategies and objectives. A review of our achievements in recent years and an assessment of the opportunities, ambitions and potential for the future was undertaken by the Trustees, support groups and staff along with external cultural stakeholders. From all of these conversations, we hope that The Johnston Collection is guided by a view that museums must be part of current debates in communities, open to new ideas as much as they are the repositories of important collections and memories.

These discussions have included the proposed redevelopment of the Trust's buildings to be a united ensemble. The architectural renderings' physical repurposing have been developed and refined. While the first stage planning application to the City of Melbourne was submitted in August 2010, we were required to present our case at a moderated session at VCAT in November 2012. The outcome of this hearing, based not only on a sensible approach to what was proposed, but also a significant voicing of support from the community for what we have done and what we propose to do, was more positive than we anticipated.

Through this thinking and planning, the period ahead will be a time in which the Trust will be considering the ongoing sustainability of the Collection. Our financial position requires realignment and we are developing a very clear

sense of purpose and ambition. Nevertheless, The Johnston Collection is fundamentally very strong. We have an excellent Board of Trustees and committed and highly professional staff and volunteers.

Our reputation as a specialist house-museum is growing. We are recognised as leaders in the delivery of museum-based education and learning. Thanks to successful programming and marketing, our public profile has never been higher.

There is no question that The Johnston Collection has grown in stature as a result of the Trustees strategic planning to build audiences and raise standards. Not only has The Johnston Collection benefited directly, but we have been able to spread that benefit to other museums and partner organisations in Victoria, and develop services to attract and retain new audiences.

Let me join with the Chairman of the Trust in thanking the very many people who have enabled the Collection to achieve so much during 2012–2013. We look forward to working with everyone over the coming year to advance our purpose and vital contribution to the Victorian community.

intake of Volunteers inducted into TJC fold, providing assistance in administration, the library, and in curatorial projects.



What we do



MISSION

The Johnston Collection (TJC) is a house-museum of fine and decorative arts in East Melbourne. Bequeathed as a gift to the people of Victoria by William Robert Johnston (1911-1986), a prominent 20th century collector and antique dealer, the Collection is displayed in a constantly changing domestic setting without ropes or barriers in Johnston's former residence, *Fairhall*.

The Johnston Collection sees its role as a museum is to provide access, understanding and enjoyment of the fine and decorative arts through the Collection.

Through a range of programmes, TJC aims to encourage visitors to the house-museum to view and consider the objects in the Collection, the Collection as a whole, and ideas around collecting, in new and challenging ways. By presenting evocative, and sometimes provocative, reinterpretations of William Johnston's collection, TJC aims to challenge visitors' assumptions about the fine and decorative arts.

GOALS & OBJECTIVES

THE JOHNSTON COLLECTION STRIVES TO:

preserve and display the Collection for the public, and to augment its holdings in fields established by William Robert Johnston (1911-1986), reflecting the interests that he embraced, and maintaining the domestic character of William Johnston's house, Fairhall.

provide access, understanding, and enjoyment of the Collection to the public through public programmes, special exhibitions, publications, education and research of the highest calibre.

offer a singular and memorable experience for the visiting public. We aim to provide an engaging view of life and art, especially relating to Johnston's collection from the English Georgian and Regency period.

serve as a hub for research and to stimulate scholarship in the history of fine and decorative arts, and the history of collecting works of fine and decorative arts especially from the English Georgian and Regency period.



Patron & Trustees

The WR Johnston Trust was established in 1986 in accordance with William Johnston's Will. The Trustees' role is to oversee and manage The WR Johnston Trust as an independent not-for-profit museum for the Trust beneficiaries, the people of Victoria. Trustees meet regularly throughout the year, including an Annual General Meeting in November.



The role of the Patron of The WR Johnston Trust includes promoting The WR Johnston Trust and the Collection in the wider community.

Rodney Davidson is a solicitor and a company director by profession and a patron of Victoria's arts and heritage. Mr Davidson is Emeritus President and Emeritus Chairman of the National Trust and was appointed President of the La Trobe Society in 2003, which position he held until 2009. He is now its Patron. He was President of the Friends of the Baillieu Library from 1978 to

1996 and has been its Patron since 2002. He was Chairman of the W R Johnston Trust from 1995 to 2009 and became a Patron of The Johnston Collection in 2009. He was Chairman of the Australian Council of National Trusts for 10 years and is now its Patron.

Other board chairmanships and memberships have included the Australian Opera Foundation, Royal Exhibition Buildings Trust Melbourne, The Copland Trust, L'Oiseau-Lyre Paris, and the Historic Buildings Preservation Council. Rodney has published several works commemorating Victoria's and Australia's building heritage, including Historic Homesteads of Australia (1969), A Book Collector's Notes (1970) Australia's Historic Buildings (1977), Historic Places of Australia, Vol. 1 and 2 (1979), and Australian Historical Buildings (1982).

The Friends of The Johnston Collection

The Friends of The Johnston Collection first met in May 1999 and the inaugural Annual General Meeting was held in August of that year. The group quickly became an integral and important part of The Johnston Collection.



The Friends of The Johnston Collection has a current membership of more than 250, including 76 new members who joined this year. The Friends is managed by a Working Committee of six elected from the membership body.

The role of The Friends of The Johnston Collection is to support the development of the Collection through events and to make better known the work of The Johnston Collection, along with raising funds.

Since their inception, The Friends have raised significant funds (over \$20,000) for the acquisition of major items for the Collection and for acquisitions for the Reference Library.

They have also contributed significant funds (over \$10,000) towards restoration projects of Collection items, along with museum equipment such as a digital camera and data-loggers.





This newsletter keeps TJC's support groups up-to-date with TJC news and events, as well as providing informative articles on subjects relating to the fine and decorative arts and history. Articles are researched and written both internally and by outside sources.

This year saw the publication of *Fairhall* Issue 6 (July 2012), Issue 7 (November 2012) and Issue 8 (March 2013).

Circulation for *Fairhall* this year was more than 300 per issue.







Volunteer Guides & Volunteers

The Johnston Collection is very fortunate to have the support of a talented and very dedicated team of Volunteers who play a vital role in the life of The Johnston Collection.



Our volunteers are pivotal in the running of the programme of events at *Fairhall* housemuseum and the Gallery, as well as in the Shop and Reference Library. Volunteers also assist The Johnston Collection Staff in curatorial, administration and publication editorial roles throughout the year.

In 2012/2013 The Johnston Collection engaged 45 volunteers. Thirty-one of these volunteers worked as Volunteer Guides rostered on every weekday and on the second Saturday and third Thursday of each month, taking visitors on guided tours through *Fairhall* house-museum and on 'Walk & Talk' tours of exhibitions in the Gallery. Another 14 volunteers worked in curatorial, administrative and editorial roles.

This year Volunteer
Guides and Volunteers
donated 8,280 hours to
The Johnston Collection.

VOLUNTEER GUIDES

The Volunteer Guides were established in mid-1999 following a discussion with ADFAS, Melbourne (The Australian Decorative and Fine Arts Society), to invite members of that group to become volunteer guides to take visitors through and interpret *Fairhall* and the Collection. Following this, a formal intake and training programme for The Johnston Collection Volunteer Guides was initiated in mid-1999. Since then, all Volunteer Guides are either full members or associated members of ADFAS.

After the opening of The Johnston Collection Gallery in May 2007, Volunteer Guides were also trained to take visitors on 'walk and talks' of the exhibitions in the Gallery.

Before being considered for selection into the Volunteer Guide training programme, potential candidates are sent a questionnaire and take part in an interview

If selected, new Volunteer Guides undergo a comprehensive 10-week training programme with internal and external tutors used to teach the course. Self-directed research projects are also incorporated into the schedule, followed by further on-the floor-training mentoring before the commencement of any house-museum tours.

New Volunteer Guides are then provided with an experienced guide or mentor for the first couple of months. The experienced guide and trainee guide then 'co-guide' tours to complete their training. Once the training period is completed, Trainee Guides become fully-fledged guides, taking tours unaccompanied.

For each rearrangement of Fairhall, all Volunteer Guides are required to train for the new tour, working with the guest curator or, in the case of the Christmas tour, with the contributors. This prepares Volunteer Guides to deliver a fresh presentation for each new tour .

Volunteer Guides impart their extensive knowledge and passion for the fine and decorative arts to visitors, along with their specialist knowledge of the items in The Johnston Collection. They bring William Johnston and his Collection to life and, at the same time, assist visitors to view and appreciate the fine and decorative arts in new and interesting ways.

In September 2012, The Johnston Collection interviewed and selected a new intake of Volunteer Guides who undertook an extensive training period

over 10 weeks. They were then mentored by existing guides for a period of time before taking tours on their own. After completing 100 hours of guiding, they were qualified to graduate as Volunteer Guides.

VOLUNTEERS

Volunteers with a wide variety of skills and experience also assist at The Johnston Collection and play a vital role in the day-to-day running of the organisation. They are deployed in a range of roles including Collection Management such as cataloguing, registration and inventory control; administration tasks including maintaining our subscriber database, assisting with mail-outs and general office duties; Reference Library roles including cataloguing and inventory control; Shop roles, including assisting in the selection and purchase of items for the shop, pricing, displaying goods and customer service.

VOLUNTEER EVENTS

Volunteers are the lifeblood of The Johnston Collection. We endeavour to make their volunteering experience as enjoyable as possible so they continue to be motivated to volunteer here.

Throughout the year, a number of events are organised for Volunteers and Volunteer Guides as a way of recognising the invaluable commitment and support they give to The Johnston Collection.

The following events were organised for volunteers and guides in 2012 | 2013:

VOLUNTEERS END OF YEAR FUNCTION

In November each year, the substantial support of all Volunteer Guides and Volunteers including the Trustees, Ambassadors, The Friends Committee, Volunteer Guides and Volunteers and supporters is acknowledged at an end of year function.

The 2012 Volunteers End of Year Function was held at the Australian Tapestry Workshop in South Melbourne on 15 November. Antonia Syme, Director of the Australian Tapestry Workshop, gave a brief presentation on the history and work of the organisation before showing guests around the Workshop to look at the tapestries currently being completed. Chairman of The WR Johnston Trust, Mr Peter Watts AM, then presented awards

to Lisa Arrowsmith, Anne Bell, Christine Bell, Ellen Dickison, Diana English, Pamela Gates and Christine Newcombe, in recognition of their five years of service to The Johnston Collection as Volunteer Guides.

VOLUNTEERS DAY OUT

Each year, The Johnston Collection celebrates the birthday of William Johnston (6 June) with a *Volunteers Day Out.* Volunteers Day Out consists of a visit to places of historical and cultural interest. This excursion is also part of The Johnston Collection's objective to provide volunteers at the Collection with ongoing educational enrichment programmes. At the same time, the Volunteers Day Out also acknowledges the significant support given to The Johnston Collection by all its volunteers throughout the year, including the Trustees, Ambassadors and The Friends Committee.

On 5 June 2013, 33 volunteers and staff members travelled by bus to the Geelong region, visiting the National Trust property Barwon Park, followed by lunch at the Gordon Davidson Restaurant (part of the Gordon TAFE Institute) in Geelong and the Geelong Art Gallery.

This event was generously supported with funds provided by The Marjorie Kingston Trust.

VOLUNTEER GUIDE TRAINING DAYS

Guide Training Days are held on the Friday before the opening of each new tour. On Volunteer Guide Training Days, Volunteer Guides are briefed on the new tour, are given Guide Training Notes prepared by the Director and Assistant Curator, and then taken through *Fairhall* with either the Curator, Guest Curator or, in the case of the Christmas tour, with the contributors of the works to the show.

Training Days enable our Volunteer Guides to learn about and then practise their presentations for each new tour. Training Days also provide Guides with an opportunity to share knowledge about the tour and the Collection with other guides.

In 2012|2013 Volunteer Guide Training Days were held for the following tours:

The Bride, The Ship & The Wardrobe: Romance Was Born Meets William Johnston on 29 June 2012

REJOICE! The 10th Anniversary Christmas at The Johnston Collection on 2 November 2012; and Barb Brownlow & Alexandra Brownlow Rearrange Mr Johnston's Collection on 8 March 2013.

VOLUNTEER INFORMATION SHARING DAYS

Twice a year, an Information Sharing Day for all volunteers is held at The Johnston Collection. Attendees include the Trustees, Ambassadors, The Friends Committee, Volunteer Guides, Volunteers and staff.

The aim of Information Sharing Days is to facilitate the discussion of ideas and information relating to the work of all the volunteers at The Johnston Collection. Attendees are encouraged to make suggestions or raise any concerns they may have about the programmes or the day-to-day running of the organisation.

Attendees are also briefed by the Director on forthcoming programmes and events at The Johnston Collection, as well as any developments or operational changes that may affect their work as volunteers.

Volunteer Information Sharing Days were held on 4 September 2012 and 21 March 2013.



Fairhall house-museum tours

It was William Johnston's wish that *Fairhall* be regularly rearranged. Since it was first opened to the public in 1990, a series of creative individuals with a background in architecture, design, art, interiors, fashion and antiques, have been invited to rearrange (or guest curate) The Johnston Collection. From this, three distinct annual house tour series have emerged.





WILLIAM JOHNSTON & HIS COLLECTION

MARCH - JUNE

In the *Mr Johnston and his Collection* tour, individuals from the wider community are invited to rearrange *Fairhall* using only the items in the Collection. Recent guest curators have included those with a background in design, interiors and

antiques. This tour provides an opportunity for talented individuals with a strong and distinctive aesthetic, along with an expertise in and knowledge of antiques, collecting and interior design, to share their response and interpretation of William Johnston's Collection with visitors.

In 2012|2013, interior designers, Barb Brownlow and Alexandra Brownlow, created *Barb Brownlow & Alexandra Brownlow Rearrange Mr Johnston's Collection* for this annual series.

HOUSE OF IDEAS

JULY - OCTOBER

In the *House of Ideas* project series, guest curators share with visitors a variety of responses to and interpretations of The Johnston Collection. The *House of Ideas* series selects creative individuals from the broader arts community, inviting them to use *Fairhall* as an installation site to recreate and reinterpret The Johnston Collection - to 'make old new' again.

In the *House of Ideas* series, guest curators, who recently have included those with a background in art, fashion design and architecture, such as Akira Isogawa and Pascale Gomes-McNabb, will often incorporate additional pieces, such as their own works and loan items, using *Fairhall* as a conceptual space.

The *House of Ideas* tour offers a less conventional interpretation of the Collection, and aims to generate a new and more diverse audience.

In 2012, fashion house Romance Was Born guest curated the *House of Ideas* series *The Bride, The Ship & The Wardrobe: Romance Was Born Meets William Johnston.*

CHRISTMAS AT THE JOHNSTON COLLECTION

NOVEMBER - FEBRUARY

Each year, the Christmas at The Johnston Collection house-museum tour engages artists and craftspeople from different regional areas of Victoria to create works inspired by The Johnston Collection. Through this series of tours, The Johnston Collection works with the guilds, craft societies and communities of artists across Victoria. By engaging these makers with the museum, The Johnston Collection supports a continuation of the traditions of crafting and artistry in rural Victoria. At the same time, in creating works for the Christmas tour, makers are encouraged to use their craft in new and challenging ways. As a result, The Johnston Collection has helped to re-invigorate the guilds, societies and communities of participating artists across Victoria.

Hundreds of makers are involved in producing the work for this special tour each year. The artists work on their projects for up to 18 months before the show. From November to February, the works are displayed in *Fairhall* against the backdrop of William Johnston's collection.



Before the opening of the Christmas tour each year, The Johnston Collection's Volunteer Guides meet the contributors. This meeting between Guides and makers enables the Guides to tell our visitors the intimate stories regarding the making of the pieces and the people behind the work, which is an intrinsic part of the Christmas tour experience. In 2012|2013, TJC celebrated the 10th anniversary of the Christmas tour with *REJOICE! The 10th Anniversary Christmas at The Johnston Collection 2012.* This tour featured selected works from previous Christmas tours at The Johnston Collection. Over 400 artists and craftspeople contributed to the work on display.

OTHER TOURS

SPECIAL 'MENU' TOURS

In addition to the three main house tours each year, special menu tours have been developed to focus on a particular area of the Collection. Special menu tours have included the Over The Tea Cups tour, focusing on the history of the ritual of taking tea and its accourrements; Unlocking The Collection tour, which allows visitors to see the hidden aspects and interior details of items in The Johnston Collection; and Staffordshire Stories, which is being developed to focus on the significant collection of Staffordshire in the Collection and the stories behind the popular and historical subjects that the figures represent.

In 2012|2013, *Unlocking The Collection* tours were held each month from July to September 2012 and again each month from March to June 2013.

HOUSE OF IDEAS PROJECT SERIES:

THE BRIDE, THE SHIP & THE WARDROBE: ROMANCE WAS BORN MEETS WILLIAM JOHNSTON WITH A SERIES OF INSTALLATION WORKS BY KATE ROHDE

2 July - 24 October 2012

Romance Was Born, one of Australia's most internationally celebrated fashion houses, rearranged The Johnston Collection for the House of Ideas series from 2 July – 24 October 2012. For this project series, The Johnston Collection sought to broaden its audience and reach out to a younger demographic. Romance Was Born has a huge and dedicated following amongst young

people, particularly those interested in fashion, theatre, art and design. Their strong presence on social media, including more than 15,000 Facebook followers, corroborated that they would be ideal to engage in and reinterpret the Collection in a fresh and fantastical way to draw in a new audience.

Romance Was Born had established a well-developed history of working collaboratively with numerous artists, galleries as well as in theatre. Their garments had also been selected for inclusion into several significant exhibitions and collected by major galleries around Australia. Luke Sales and Anna Plunkett, the duo behind Romance Was Born, wanted to curate a series of spaces within *Fairhall* to convey various stories. They began by creating themes for each room in the house based, in part, on the existing colours of the individual rooms. They then elaborated on and reinforced these with their careful selection and

rearrangement of pieces from the Collection. Into each of these imaginatively designed spaces they introduced examples of their garments. Some were displayed on mannequins and posed, while others were cast across furniture, as if abandoned by an imaginary wearer.

A series of installations by Melbourne-based artist Kate Rohde, who Romance Was Born had collaborated with previously, was also featured in *The Bride, The Ship & The Wardrobe | Romance Was Born meets William Johnston.* This added to the colour and spectacle of Sales and Plunkett's rearrangement of the Collection.

The Johnston Collection's vision for this tour was to engage with a broader and, in particular, a younger audience. Although not strictly surveyed, visitors on this tour were noticeably younger than those attending previous house-museum tours. (Interestingly, at least one young visitor said that she had brought along her parents to see *The Bride, The Ship & The Wardrobe!* – an indicative and revealing reversal of the usual way of encouraging visits to the Collection). Along with the traditional print media, The Johnston Collection widely utilised social media to promote the tour, both before and during its duration, with the aim of connecting to younger users of social media. The Johnston Collection established its own

Facebook page around this time and was able to link with other pages and fashion bloggers to successfully publicise the tour.

An unexpected but exceptional outcome following the conclusion of *The Bride, The Ship & The Wardrobe* tour, was that Romance Was Born were equally inspired to create a new collection based on The Johnston Collection itself. Titled *Little Lord Fauntleroy,* the duo produced a range of garments with patterns and designs based on the Staffordshire pottery and porcelain pieces from The Johnston Collection. This Spring/Summer 2013 fashion collection has now been sold all over the world

In December 2012, well-known US rapper, Nicki Minaj, stepped out in a quilted ruffle dress from the S/S 2013 *Little Lord Fauntleroy* collection at her Sydney Perfume launch. Minaj was photographed wearing the one-off 18th century French-inspired whimsical ensemble that featured hybridised intricate patterns and motifs taken from the delicate floral and figurative pottery and porcelain from the Collection. The event and Collectioninspired garment went viral (see above).

CHRISTMAS AT THE JOHNSTON COLLECTION SERIES:

REJOICE! THE 10^{TH} ANNIVERSARY CHRISTMAS AT THE JOHNSTON COLLECTION 2012

8 November 2012 - 27 February 2013

In *REJOICE! The 10th Anniversary Christmas at The Johnston Collection 2012,* we celebrated the 10th anniversary of the Christmas series with a survey tour showing selected works from the past five Christmas tours.

Since 2006, crafts groups from different Victorian regions have transformed *Fairhall* each Christmas.

The brief is always the same – that each decoration should be inspired by the line, form, colour or decoration of objects in The Johnston Collection, the story of William Johnston and Christmas itself, in the domestic setting of Fairhall. For REJOICE! The 10th Anniversary Christmas at The Johnston Collection 2012, groups and individuals from Castlemaine (2007-2008), Bendigo (2008-2009), Geelong and the Bellarine Peninsula (2009-2010), Warrnambool / Western District (2010-2011) and Wangaratta / North East (2011-2012) were invited to return selected pieces

from their tours.

The artists and craftspeople represented in *REJOICE!* included embroiderers, quilters, patchworkers, handweavers, CWAs, spinners, glassblowers, porcelain painters, and a host of individual artists and craftspeople using a variety of media.

As REJOICE! The 10th Anniversary Christmas at The Johnston Collection 2012 was a survey show, it enabled visitors to see the many creative responses to the Collection by contributors over the last five years.

Anecdotally, many of the visitors to the *REJOICE!* tour were makers themselves, who had come to the Christmas tour for creative inspiration.

Contributors from past Christmas tours also visited *REJOICE!*, reportedly interested to see how other makers had interpreted and responded to the brief for creating pieces for the Christmas tour. *REJOICE!* provided them with an opportunity to share ideas and craft techniques with other makers from around Victoria.

WILLIAM JOHNSTON AND HIS COLLECTION SERIES:

BARB BROWNLOW & ALEXANDRA BROWNLOW REARRANGE MR JOHNSTON'S COLLECTION

12 March – 19 June 2013

Two of Melbourne's most talented and well-regarded interior designers, Barb Brownlow and Alexandra Brownlow, explored the idea of 21st century living designed around historic objects in Barb Brownlow & Alexandra Brownlow Rearrange Mr Johnston's Collection.

In their conceptualisation of *Fairhall* and the Collection, Barb and Alexandra considered William Johnston as if he were a client living today, transforming *Fairhall* into a contemporary gentleman's residence.

Drawing upon what they had learned about William Johnston's history, work, interests, tastes and friends, the Brownlows created a design for *Fairhall* that they felt would have suited Johnston's public and private lives.

The Brownlow's conceived some rooms as places where Johnston might have brought clients, decorating these rooms with many of Johnston's finest pieces to create a sense of understated luxury and refinement. The Brownlows dressed other rooms more extravagantly, conceiving these rooms as places where Johnston may have brought closer friends who would appreciate the more flamboyant decoration. Other rooms were set up as private places, where Johnston may have retreated from public life into a more reflective space.

The Brownlows' careful thought and planning into the style and purpose of each room, with particular emphasis on its functionality, resulted in the transformation of *Fairhall* into an elegant and comfortable interior reflecting 21st century living.

SPECIAL 'MENU' TOURS

UNLOCKING THE COLLECTION

The popular *Unlocking The Collection* series of house-museum tours were programmed for one day each month from July to October 2012 and again from March to June 2013. This tour enabled visitors to see aspects of items in the Collection that are hidden during other *Fairhall* tours.

Working in pairs, Volunteer Guides unlocked cupboards, pulled out secret drawers and lifted the lids and covers of objects, revealing the hidden and often intricate details of the interior of the pieces in the Collection.

Gallery

Commencing in May 2007, in the building adjoining the Administration wing and *Fairhall*, The Johnston Collection Gallery holds a regular programme of changing exhibitions, lectures, workshops, study days and special events.



EXHIBITIONS

Two exhibitions are held in the Gallery each year from March to June and July to October. Exhibitions are curated in-house or by guest curators. Recent past exhibitions include *Fluid Borders* (2010), *The Garden of Ideas* (2011) and *Pride & Ornament: The Folly of Vanity* (2012).

Exhibitions in the Gallery in 2012|2013 were Commanding Splendour: The Duke of Wellington and the Empire Style (July – October 2012) and Women Making History: Writers, Thinkers, Makers, Icons 1700-1900 (March – June 2013), scheduled to coincide with the bicentenary of the publication of Jane Austen's Pride and Prejudice

Exhibitions





COMMANDING SPLENDOUR:

THE DUKE OF WELLINGTON AND THE EMPIRE STYLE

2 July - 26 October, 2012

This exhibition considered the objects created to commemorate the Duke of Wellington, and explored the theme of Empire style as it emerged in England in the early 19th century. The exhibition included items from The Johnston Collection along with significant works from both private and public collections. Loan items included rare books and manuscripts from the Special Collections at the University of Melbourne Library, many of which had seldom been on public display.

Commanding Splendour was a free exhibition that house-museum visitors and lecture attendees could choose to view after their tour or lecture.

The Commanding Splendour Study Series of lectures accompanied this exhibition.

WOMEN MAKING HISTORY:

WRITERS, THINKERS, MAKERS, ICONS 1700–1900

12 March – 19 June 2013

Inspired by the bicentenary of Jane Austen's *Pride* and *Prejudice*, this exhibition explored the role of women as writers, thinkers, makers, archetypes and artistic subjects from the 18th to the close of the 19th century. The exhibition included items from The Johnston Collection as well as from private and public collections.

The Women Making History Study Series of lectures accompanied this exhibition.

Lectures & Workshops



LECTURES & WORKSHOPS

Lectures and workshops are held regularly (usually twice-weekly) in the Gallery from March to October. Speakers hail from a wide variety of disciplines and address a broad spectrum of topics. Workshops with experts providing practical advice and hands-on demonstrations on topics relating to the care and conservation of fine and decorative arts are also held in the Gallery throughout the year.

STUDY SERIES

In conjunction with our regular lecture series, The Johnston Collection also runs a number of Study Series from March to October. Presented by well-known art and cultural historians, the Study Series allows for the exploration of a topic to be further extended and developed. A Study Series will often accompany exhibitions in the Gallery, expanding on the themes explored in the display.

THE ANNUAL STUDY DAY

Each year since 2011, The Johnston Collection has held an annual Study Day, usually on the second Saturday of October. Study Days focus on a particular theme each year, and various speakers are engaged to present a series of lectures throughout the day. Past Study Days have included *The Garden of Ideas*, (Study Days 1 & 2) in 2011; and *The Delicate Art of Deception: Revealing Fakes and Forgeries* in 2012.



From time to time, The Johnston Collection also works with students from secondary and tertiary institutions on special collaborative projects.

JULY -OCTOBER 2012

In partnership with Design Made Trade, RMIT University Bachelor of Arts (Textile Design) students created contemporary textiles inspired by The Johnston Collection. These were exhibited in the Kent Room from July to October 2012.





Shop

The Johnston Collection Shop was first established in 2003 and plays an important part in our visitor experience. Visitors are given an opportunity to browse in the shop at the completion of their tour, lecture or exhibition viewing.



TJC now retails in two areas of the properties, in the Garden Room in the months of March to October and in the Gallery as the 'Emporium' during November to February. The Gallery retail area has been improved over the last year with an increase in the display area and a higher volume of stock.

The Shop stocks items that complement the Collection by design or style and include household wares, toiletries, books, cards and specialty stationery. This year we continued to optimise retail sales based on the Collection with the commissioning of the production of some collection-based items to promote the collection, including the 'Minton cup' card.

There have also been a small number of contemporary works based on items created for the Christmas tours. These items have been retailed through the Shop with great success.

The Shop has been a gradually developing aspect of the income-generating operations of The Johnston Collection over the last five years. The Visitor Services Staff and Volunteers have been invaluable in sourcing, evaluating, and promoting retail material.

This year, Shop income, although slightly down from the previous year, represented a significant portion (12%) of the annual income earned by TJC.



Marketing

The marketing goals for the year were to support TJC's tours, exhibitions, lectures and workshop programmes through targeted marketing campaigns, and to increase visitation to The Johnston Collection by under-represented groups, such as younger people.

Our marketing and communications strategy for 2012–2013 included a focus on social media to reach a younger audience and electronic direct mail, to enable a more comprehensive and immediate distribution of our brochures and newsletters, and to reduce costs.

SOCIAL MEDIA



FACEBOOK

In 2012, TJC set up a page on the social networking site Facebook, to

further engage with our audience, particularly our growing younger audience. Our Facebook page provided a platform for users to give feedback on their visitor experience as well as to share information and ask questions relating to The Johnston Collection in particular, and the fine and decorative arts in general.

As well as publicising TJC's programmes and events, our Facebook page facilitated cross-promotion with other similar organisations by linking with their pages and sharing each other's posts.

ELECTRONIC DIRECT MAIL (EDM)

Our email distribution list grew this year, from around 4,900 in July 2012 to nearly 6,600 in June 2013, rapidly replacing our former hard-copy mail-based distribution list.

In 2012, TJC began a monthly e-newsletter to provide updates and news on TJC's programme of events to subscribers on our e-distribution list. The effectiveness of our e-newsletter in promoting our programmes was demonstrated by a spike in tour, lecture and exhibition bookings immediately following its distribution each month.

The e-newsletter also enabled us to publicise other services provided by The Johnston Collection, such as our Reference Library and Shop.

Our twice yearly *What's On* brochure was distributed primarily by EDM in 2012-2013 resulting in a large decrease in the number of hard-copy brochures printed, and a subsequent reduction in printing and postage costs.


WEBSITE


Our website continued to receive a substantial number of hits and many of our first time visitors reported it is where they first heard about The Johnston Collection.

Since the introduction of an online booking system in 2011, visitors have increasingly preferred to make bookings through our webpage rather than by telephone.

From July 2012 to June 2013 the following analytics were recorded:

MEDIA

Local, state and national media were approached to promote The Johnston Collection programmes throughout the year. Existing media contacts were used and new relationships forged in the course of promoting each of the different house tours, exhibitions, lectures and workshops.

Throughout the year, major media coverage was achieved for all of TJC's programmes. In particular, *The Bride, The Ship & The Wardrobe* generated unprecedented interest from print, web-based and social media.

Visitors

This year saw an increase in younger visitors to The Johnston Collection. The House of Ideas tour, The Bride, The Ship & The Wardrobe: Romance Was Born Meets William Johnston, was visited by a noticeably younger demographic, which our social media campaign had helped us to target directly.

From December 2012, bookings were categorised into 'New Visitors' or 'Previous Visitors'. While our Christmas tours generate new audiences from around Victoria as new regions participate each year, we were expecting a higher number of previous visitors to *REJOICE!* | The 10th Anniversary Christmas at The Johnston Collection 2012 as it was a survey tour. We were surprised that first-time visitors outnumbered previous visitors for this tour.

Visitors to the *William Johnston and His Collection* tour were evenly divided between first-time visitors and previous visitors.

This year, total visitor numbers to The Johnston Collection were down from the previous year by 10%, from 8560 to 7656 in 2012-2013.

House-museum visitors were down nearly 6% from the previous year (7033 in 2011-2012 to 6620 this year). This was largely due to a 9% drop in visitors to the *Christmas at The Johnston Collection* tour (November to February, from 4405 in 20112-2012 to 4021 in 2012-2013.

Visitors to *The House of Ideas* tour (July to October) were up in 2012-2013 with an increase of around 4% for this tour over the previous year. The *William Johnston and His Collection* tour (March to June) was down by around 7%.

In The Johnston Collection Gallery, 970 people attended our Lecture series, down 23% from the previous year. Exhibition attendance figures were not recorded for the whole year as the *Commanding Splendour* exhibition was a free exhibition that house-museum visitors and lecture attendees could choose to view after their tour or lecture.

Building Redevelopment

In 2010, the WR Johnston Trust initiated a revitalisation plan for The Johnston Collection building complex. Trethowan Architects were engaged to draw up plans, and planning approval for the development was sought from the City of Melbourne.

In October 2012, The Johnston Collection appeared at the Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal (VCAT) for a hearing brought against the TJC regarding its proposed redevelopment. A favourable outcome was received.

VCAT granted permission to proceed with the redevelopment project of the Collection buildings and also approved an increase in the number of visitors that TJC can host at any given time.

Since the VCAT decision, TJC has been working with the City of Melbourne to refine its Management Plan to ensure compliance of the day-to-day working and broader access requirements imposed by the City of Melbourne.

Having been granted planning approval for the redevelopment of the Collection buildings, in 2012 to 2013, The Johnston Collection launched a fundraising programme to finance the building project and to ensure the long-term sustainability of the organisation (see page xxx).

In a series of meetings over the 2012 to 2013 period, the Trustees have worked through and developed an updated master plan for the building project as part of the 'Open Doors' fundraising campaign. It is anticipated that it will be rolled out in four stages, as follows:

STAGE 01 | 'refresh' will involve the refurbishment of *Fairhall*. This will refurbish the house-museum into a 'creative hub' for new ways of working with the Collection.

STAGE 02 | 'renovate' will be an interim solution that will involve the tidying up of the Administration wings.

STAGE 03 | 'recapture' will see a breakthrough into the property adjoining the Administration wing, and installing a lift and public amenities.

STAGE 04 | 'renew' will see the creation of a grand space in one of the existing Administration buildings. This space will include underground storage, the first floor purpose-built gallery, a new retail area and the second floor multi-purpose area for lectures and workshops.

SALE OF 146 HOTHAM ST

In 2013, The WR Johnston Trust agreed to the sale of its property at 146 Hotham Street with a view to consolidating its property portfolio to include only the buildings in the redevelopment project. In May 2013, the property was sold and the funds reinvested in the endowment.






